PRESIDENT'S REPORT

My term as President began as the MALA was grappling with some heady questions: how do we broaden our membership while protecting the public? How do we embrace diversity without losing identity? Thanks to some excellent debate and thoughtful work by the volunteers entrusted with guiding us through these issues, I believe we have arrived with a better sense of who we are.

But where to from here?

This question and some nagging concern about the relevancy of the Association's services – many non-members are well into their careers – led to my first act as President: the 2008 Priorities Survey. This survey was drafted to test the validity of our assumptions about what is important to the membership. It was also a chance to rate how the MALA has been meeting your professional and academic needs.

As reported, we compared the ranked importance of various activities/benefits to the members' assessment of MALA's performance in each, and decided to focus where there was greatest disparity. This revealed three top priorities:

- Advocating for the Profession
- Continuing Education
- Advocating for Land Stewardship

“Improved Liaison with the University” was the most frequently mentioned issue, so Council is treating this as a fourth priority.

Advocating for the Profession

Our first response to advocating for the profession was to resurrect and rejuvenate the Name Act campaign. New federal legislation has forced this issue to the

fore-front – it is now more urgent (and more hopeful) than ever before, as the Past President's report will explain.

A second response was to form a Promotions Committee. Bob Somers has agreed to sit as inaugural chair. The Committee will be responsible for raising the profile of the profession through events, public announcements, and outreach. We are counting on this Committee for some great ideas to convey the breadth and vitality of our profession. You can all do your part by participating in World Landscape Architecture month activities this April. Information and ideas on this will be forthcoming.

We have also begun arranging introductory meetings with government and university representatives to ensure they are aware of the profession and our Association. It is intended that subsequent meetings will be arranged to cover specific issues, and more directly promote the benefits of hiring professional landscape architects.

Continuing Education

Several respondents asked for easier access to quality continuing education opportunities. Many saw this as a primary role of the Association. Refer to the Report of the Continuing Education Committee for some significant improvements in this area.

Advocating for Land Stewardship

Council interpreted this direction from the membership as taking an active role in supporting green initiatives and conservation. We see the MALA's public stand against cutting down Exchange District trees for a movie shoot in 1993 as a model for this form of advocacy. Council also reviewed the language in the Code of Conduct to see how it compares to other CSLA components on stewardship matters, and determined the document stands up well. We encourage the membership to keep Council informed of specific issues where they feel MALA support is warranted.

Improved Liaison with the University

This year we will be re-launching the *University Liaison Committee*, though likely in a leaner, more action-oriented form than its previous incarnation. The intent is to forge meaningful connections between the faculty, students, and practitioners. Member suggestions on composition of the Committee and conduct of these meetings are welcome.

Half of my term is over, and it feels like I have just begun. With a number of new young and energetic Members on Council raising expectations and acting on them, I am more hopeful than ever that we will soon see a more vigorous and effective Association. Stay tuned.

PAST PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Past President represents MALA at the CSLA Board of Directors.

The CSLA Board of Directors met in person during February prior to Congress 2008 in Quebec City, in June in Calgary, and in Moncton during November. In addition, numerous telephone meetings were conducted.

2008 saw the retirement of long-time CSLA Executive Director Fran Pauzé and the transition to the new Executive Director Paulette Vinette. This left the CSLA office somewhat understaffed during the late summer and fall and presented both challenges and opportunities for the Board.

Prior to the Congress in Quebec City, the CSLA met with component presidents in order to open a broader dialog between the components and the CSLA. The open discussion of concerns and issues facing the profession moving forward was viewed by all as a valuable exercise and is intended to be repeated prior to future Congresses.

The Congress in Quebec City also saw the CSLA award its first Landmark Award; in this case to the historical (and adjacent) Plains of Abraham.

The CSLA Awards of Excellence (2008) received 57 entries with 11 National and 15 Regional awards being given. The National Awards were presented at Congress in Quebec City.

The Board of CSLA spent some time examining reciprocity both in terms of barriers to implementation and the current context. Recently, however, the Federal and Provincial governments have signed agreements that have implications in terms

of the motility of Members across components. This agreement provides a mechanism for reciprocity only between those components that have been recognized through legislation. This will remain an issue moving forward and will take some of the Board's attention in 2009.

Through the course of the year, the CSLA website saw many changes, including the complete revamp of the 'Job' board and a revised calendar. If you haven't visited it lately ... www.csla.ca

Looking forward I would like to highlight that 2009 is the CSLA's 75th anniversary and that CSLA will be celebrating it in its birthplace – Toronto – during Congress in August.

There are currently 26 Associate members of MALA with 5 new Associates this year.

As the Associates Representative, I feel that it is important to encourage discussion amongst Associate members. My first action was to reach out to the Associate membership to determine what people were concerned with, had opinions on, and what activities they might be interested in pursuing. Thank you to all who responded and took part in that dialogue.

In November, an Associates Meeting was held to discuss current LA and MALA issues, initiatives, and topics that concern Associate members. REPORT OF THE REGISTRATION COMMITTEE

A new three member Registration Committee was formed in December 2008. The Committee is represented by Natasa Juck, Chair; Cheryl Oakden; and Rick Hurst (Chair of Examining Board at given time).

The new mandate for this Committee was proposed and adopted by Council on October 16, 2008. In a nutshell, it states that the Committee is responsible for reviewing requirements for membership in the Association, as directed by Council on an ongoing basis.

The Committee met for the first time in January of this year to discuss and render an opinion on two issues forwarded to the Committee in late December. The issues were:

1. Involvement of Examining Board in approval of Applications for Admission as Friend of the Profession of Landscape Architecture, and
2. Residency criteria for approval of Active Out-of-Province Member residing outside of Canada.

The Registration Committee recommended revising the MALA membership policy and application form for Friend of Profession of Landscape Architecture to indicate that applications will not require the action of the Examining Board, since there is no real deliberation involved in assessing applicants. Applications will be submitted directly to Council for review and approval.

The Registration Committee is considering maintaining present admission requirements for Active Out-of-Province Members (one of which is residency in Canada) and

establishing a new category for Active International Members, with a specific set of requirements relevant to applicants from USA and other countries. We are presently reviewing OALA and BCSLA models. The Committee requires more time to carefully consider this matter and will render a draft of this new category in due course.

The MALA Calendar of Events is regularly updated with events, presentations, lectures, conferences, registration, and the Faculty of Architecture activities.

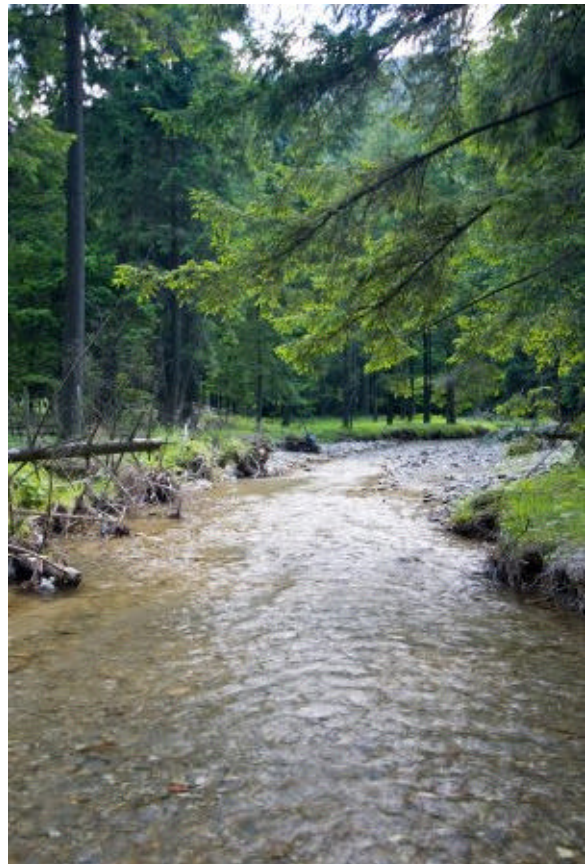

REPORT OF THE CONTINUING EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The Continuation Education Committee is a new Committee formed primarily to address the results from the 2008 MALA Priorities Survey. In this survey, the membership listed continuing education as one of the top two priorities for MALA to pursue. The Continuing Education Committee was also formed to prepare for potential future requirements associated with Name Act legislation, where continuing education monitoring will be required as part of the professional designation.

Developing a comprehensive Continuing Education Program will occur over many years, and perhaps in partnership with CSLA. It is our intention over the long term to offer more promotion of events, to host our own events, to create a more comprehensive system of rating events, and to make it easier to log and submit your continuing education credits.

The main accomplishment of MALA and the Continuing Education Committee this year was the creation of an electronic credit log system. Do you find logging your continuing education hours at the end of the year a bother? We now have an electronic system to log and submit your continuing education hours. After you have participated in a continuing education activity, go to the MALA website (www.mala.net) and sign in under the tab 'Members'. (If you have not created a member profile, please create one now.) Under the 'Members' section there is now a link to an electronic form; fill out the form and submit your hours. We hope you like this new system, and we encourage you to use it throughout the year as we build up the events available for members.

This year, the Continuing Education Committee (along with Valerie) has been active in searching for events, workshops and lectures hosted by partner associations, in Winnipeg and across Canada. The MALA website's Calendar of Events (<http://www.mala.net/events.php>) is continuously being updated with these events. Make sure to check the website to see what is coming up.

If you have any suggestions of other organizations to partner with, if you hear of an event that isn't yet on the calendar, or if you have ideas for continuing education events to host – please let me know. REPORT OF THE ETHICS COMMITTEE

There have been two items of note during the last 12 months.

First, a question was raised by the client of a Member about the conduct of that Member. Upon detailed review of the documents relating to that question, it was determined that there was no concrete evidence of contravention of the Code by that Member. It was also noted that determined attempts were being made by the Member to resolve the differences between the parties. It was therefore recommended that no further action be taken unless and until MALA was informed that those attempts had failed and that the client remained aggrieved.

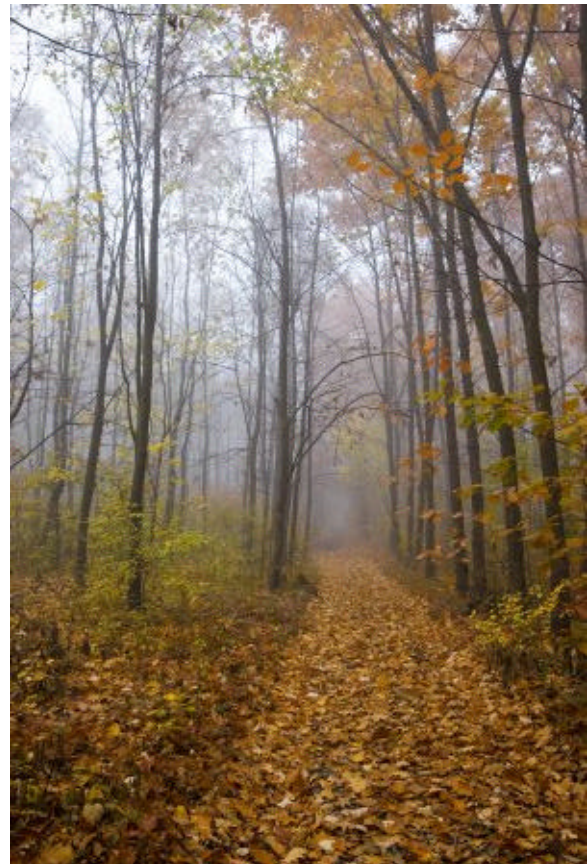
Second, there was a question in MALA Council about the robustness of the Code in addressing Members' responsibilities with respect to the natural environment – particularly relative to the Codes of other components of the CSLA. The response was along the lines of:

On the one hand public and professional reaction to environmental concerns has become more vociferous since the Code was approved in 2003. On the other hand, it is important to recall that the phrasing of the Code related very strongly to what can be reasonably expected and MALA's ability to monitor it.

Additionally, is there much difference in practice between the ASLA's "have an ethical obligation to" or BCSLA's (questionably worded) "obligation to use a duty of care ... must have due regard ... will use the due skill and care ..." and MALA's expectations of comprehension, responsibility and mindfulness in such matters?

Equally is there a great deal of difference in OALA's "shall always respond morally ... shall exert every effort" or its requirement not to place members' / client's commercial interests above those of public health/safety/welfare? And it is all very well to "demand" rather than simply to "desire" (a weaker word than the MALA's current "expectations") – it sounds stronger but does it actually change the intention and, whatever the wording, how would MALA actually determine that somebody had failed in these obligations – whether they are demanded or expected?

REPORT OF THE NAME ACT TASKFORCE

No major advancements in terms of MALA's quest for Name Act Legislation were achieved in 2008. The Government of Manitoba still considers dealing with our pursuit a low priority. Time has come to follow the political route, rather than continuing the normal process through the Department of Labour and other branches of the Manitoba Government.

Our situation has been further complicated by the Federal Government's professional inter-provincial labour mobility initiative (Agreement on Internal Trade) which excludes the profession of Landscape Architecture in provinces that are not regulated by Name Act legislation.

The Taskforce is currently searching for a person who can be retained to lobby our cause with the government in power and the official opposition.

We will keep the membership informed as the process evolves.

REPORT OF THE CONSULTANT FEE SCHEDULE TASKFORCE

The Consultant Fee Schedule Taskforce has been tasked with reviewing the existing Fee Schedule to reflect the changes within the industry. An initial round table meeting between member firms was held to discuss issues with the existing document and to introduce the framework of similar professional associations' fee structures (Association of Professional Engineers and Geoscientists of Manitoba, Manitoba Association of Architects, Alberta Association of Landscape Architects, etc...).

The ideas and issues have been taken away by the taskforce to develop a draft Fee Schedule that reflects the goals of the Association, and to act as a useful document in the consultant-client relationship. The Fee Schedule is intended to set a fee structure for types of work, hourly billable wage for levels of ability, and provide clear direction on disbursements within a percentage-based contract.

A draft of the Fee Schedule is intended to be prepared and circulated to those participants from the original round table meeting in the spring of 2009. This draft will be revised and provided to the membership later in 2009 for consideration and approval.

REPORTS FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE

This past year has seen a lot of change in the Faculty of Architecture. In September the new Landscape + Urbanism option was started. This new two-year option is being co-taught with the Department of City Planning and will have a total of 60 students when it is fully phased in. This will be the last year of the old Landscape Architecture option, which has over the years served our Department very well. For those who are familiar with the studios in the Russell Building the entire studio space on the south side is now Landscape. The synergy is fantastic. With the new option being phased in, the Department is taking this opportunity to put forward a major reform of the graduate curriculum. The highlights of these changes are: the creation of a 3-year accredited degree that integrates the Pre-Master's program into the Masters degree; the opportunity for B. L. Arch. and B.E.D. L+U option students to take a 52 week intensive professional degree; and the creation of a non-professional Design Studies option for students to explore the broader issues of landscape.

This past summer we welcomed Anna Thurmayr to our department. Anna is a Landscape Architect from Germany (now a member of the MALA) and takes up the position of Assistant Professor in our Department that was previously held by Charlie Thomsen, who retired last year. Anna will be teaching the Digital Drawing Workshop, Design Studio and the new Construction Materials course. This appointment brings our faculty to nine full time positions and one contract position.
